Whether or not you are a union member, this is the place for all workers to be on June 9th! Let's get ready to elect people who care about workers. At the meeting, which will feature Senator Natalie Murdoch and Representative Robert Reives, you will hear Gene Nichol on what is at stake for workers in our state, Grant Welch on the challenge of passing legislation that supports labor, and Keith Busby on broadband in NC and the impact of Biden's American Rescue Plan.

More on the featured speakers:

Gene Nichol is a disturber, a rabble-rouser, an outspoken fighter for equity, and fairness, and a fearless fighter for progressive values. A participant in Moral Mondays, the UNC BOG shut down his Poverty Center to stop his work. Shortly after, the UNC law school launched the North Carolina Poverty Research Fund, which continues to provide a platform for Nichol. In 2020 he released, *Indecent Assembly: The North Carolina Legislature's Blueprint for the War on Democracy and Equality,* exposing the state's all-white Republican legislative caucuses and their political agenda hostile to the poor, people of color, women, and LGBTQ+ people. In 2023 he published *Lessons From North Carolina: Race, Religion, Tribe and the Future of America.*

Keith Busby Keith is one of 2 District Leads responsible for the 9 states in CWA District 3. Keith has worked on multiple projects related to Broadband improvement for the state of NC. He was the Project Manager for a CWA/Microsoft Joint Project for the ACP Program (Affordable Connectivity Program) to help make Broadband affordable to those in need in NC. Keith has also worked with the NCDIT to help close the Digital Equity Divide. Recently Keith has been appointed to the North Carolina Department of Information Technology (NCDIT) Labor Task Force. To help NCDIT deal with labor shortages as the state begins to roll out its Broadband improvement program. As a member of the CWA Legislative-Political Team, Keith has worked to establish relationships with elected officials from State, Federal, and Local Government. Keith is a 24-year member of CWA.

Grant Welch is *CWA NC* Legislative-Political Director and Vice President NC AFL-CIO Grant leads the NC legislative team in the fight for all workers across the state. As a registered lobbyist for CWA, he and the team have introduced and lobbied multiple bills to keep our call center worker jobs in NC, expand access to affordable, high-speed broadband, increase wages and benefits to working people, maintain collective bargaining provisions, fight against right to work laws, and repeal the ban on public sector bargaining. The NC legislative team has built relationships with elected officials and candidates on both sides of the aisle, from national to local government. Grant is a 25-year member of CWA.

Community Discussion With Chatham County Commissioner David Delaney: Briar Chapel and Environs -- 2050, June 11, 6 – 8 p.m., Chatham Grove Community Center, 1301 Andrews Store Road, Pittsboro

Briar Chapel and Fearrington Village make the northern segment of US 15-501 the densest part of unincorporated Chatham County. The 27312, 27516, and 27517 zip codes merge here encompassing parts of five election precincts, 3 board of education districts, and 3 different commissioner districts. Since 2017, Plan Chatham's strategic vision includes such diverse goals as foster a healthy community, preserve Chatham's rural character, provide infrastructure for economic development and compact growth in cities and dense areas, ensure equitable housing and education, and conserve natural resources. This event asks residents to engage in structured discussion with each other to jointly envision this area in 2050. Near-term influences on that visioning include completion of the Unified Development Ordinance, Pittsboro seeking satellite annexation authority, Briar Chapel completing development, and Chapel Hill planning to extend infrastructure and development to Smith Level Road. The conversation occurs as communities nationwide consider ways to address social and economic poverty, bridge urban-rural differences (many perceived), and build resilient communities. News from the North Carolina Democratic Party

Pride Month: This Saturday marks the beginning of LGBTQ+ Pride Month. As <u>LGBTQ+</u> <u>folks</u>, especially transgender children, are used as political footballs by the far-right, use this month to show solidarity with the LGBTQ+ individuals in your community. **Kick off Pride Month with NCDP on Monday**, **June 3rd at 6pm at the NCDP HQ in Raleigh.**

New lows on abortion: At a rally on Halifax Mall this month, GOP Rep. Neal Jackson described North Carolina's 12-week abortion ban as a "down payment." It's incredibly apparent that the Republican Party plans on taking abortion bans as far as they can get them. We must defeat Mark Robinson so that Josh Stein can veto any abortion bans, and break the supermajority so that his veto is final.

Spotlight on Wesley Harris: We're taking another dive into our Council of State candidates and their Republican opponents. This week we're putting the spotlight on Rep. Wesley Harris running to be our next State Treasurer.

Rep. Harris is the legislature's only PhD economist—and if there's one thing he wants you to know about how our state is spending our money, it's that our state's pension fund has the largest cash reserve of any state pension fund in the country. Great, right? Wrong, actually. Unlike investments, cash doesn't have returns and can't adapt to inflation. The more cash we keep, the more money we're losing when the dollar changes value—let alone the lost value from that money not being invested anywhere. It's failures like this that Rep. Harris is running to address so that we can protect the healthcare and retirements of our state employees.

Meanwhile, his Republican opponent Brad Briner is running on ceding his decision-making power over the State Health Plan to a board that the gerrymandered GOP legislature would appoint. Because of the culture wars pushed by the current Treasurer, the State Health Plan has been politicized over what the plan will and will not cover, like weight loss medication or gender-affirming care (like hormone therapy). Interestingly, Briner's claim to fame is that he was CIO for Mike Bloomberg's family office (for those of us who aren't billionaires, that's something you have when you're so rich you have a team of people managing your money for you). You know, the same Mike Bloomberg who recently ran for president as a Democrat.

Mark Robinson: Republicans "were right" about HB2 NEW

- Lt. Gov. Mark Robinson (R) continued his campaign of controversial statements by saying Republicans "were right about HB2" as he spoke to supporters at a recent campaign event.
- "We were right about HB2. We told them. You start letting these men go in these bathrooms, the next thing you know. What's the next step after that? That's exactly what we said. What's the next step after that? Guess what the next step was: your daughter losing her scholarship to a biological man in swimming,

volleyball, basketball," **Robinson said.** "We were right on HB2 and continue to be right on it. The ideas that the left has is a bunch of foolishness. We don't need to be ashamed to say it."

- The law sparked national backlash as some companies dropped plans to bring jobs to the state and some major events, such as the NBA All-Star Game, were moved out of North Carolina.
- A few months after Gov. Roy Cooper (D) was elected in 2016, the legislature repealed the law.
- An <u>Associated Press analysis at the time</u> found the law cost the state more than
 \$3.76 billion over 12 years in lost business.
- Stein campaign spokesperson Morgan Hopkins responded, "Mark Robinson would repeat the failures of HB2: thousands of jobs lost, companies fleeing the state, and billions in losses for North Carolina's economy. We've been down this road before, and it's a dead end. Josh Stein's vision for North Carolina is forward-looking and will create a welcoming economic climate for workers and businesses."

Governor Cooper Vetoes One Bill

Governor Roy Cooper vetoed the following bill:

House Bill 198: <u>DOT Legislative Changes.-AB</u>

Governor Cooper made the following statement on his veto of HB 198:

"Protecting North Carolina's beauty should be a top priority, but this legislation allows tree cutting and destruction of native plants around billboards. In February, I signed Executive Order 305, which sets comprehensive goals for restoring and protecting natural areas, prioritizing native plants and planting one million trees. North Carolina's scenic landscapes are one of the reasons why our state just broke records with our tourism economy, and why we have one of the most beautiful places in the world to live. Therefore, I veto the bill."
