Martin graduated from UNC-Chapel Hill and the UNC School of Law and began his career as a public defender. He now runs a mediation and appellate law practice.

In the 2022 election, Moore was the only NC Democrat to flip a Republican-held county commissioner seat. His endorsements include Justice Allison Riggs, Buncombe Co Sheriff Quentin Miller and Buncombe County Commissioner Jasmine Beach-Ferrara.

Meet Justice Allison Riggs, NC Supreme Court and NC Representative Robert Reives, Democratic Leader, October 9, 6 - 7:30 p.m., CORA Food Pantry

Join us for this exciting event to meet NC Supreme Court Justice Allison Riggs and NC House Democratic Leader Robert Reives, two of NC finest, running to keep their seats.

Justice Riggs was appointed to the NC Supreme Court in 2023 by Governor Roy Cooper. She has spent her entire career fighting for equal justice under the law for every person, regardless of wealth or skin color. Justice Riggs is an accomplished litigator, having argued before the U.S. Supreme Court in several landmark redistricting cases. Prior to her current position on the NC Supreme Court, she served on the NC Court of Appeals, and beforehand, served as Co-Executive Director for Programs and Chief Counsel for Voting Rights at the Southern Coalition for Social Justice in Durham. She's a strong advocate for our constitutional and voting rights.

Minority Leader Reives has served in the NC House of Representatives since 2014. He represents House District 54, which includes all of Chatham County and portions of Randolph County. Rep. Reives is known for his skills working across party lines and has sponsored legislation to strengthen public schools and to help protect children, the disabled, the environment, and property rights. He listens to the needs of constituents and has championed specific legislation to help Chatham meet its vision of tomorrow.

At this event you can hear more from both of them (they are great speakers!) and ask questions in a relaxed informal setting. There will be refreshments too!

News from the North Carolina Democratic Party

State of the Race

- Mark Robinson's senior adviser, campaign manager, finance director, and deputy campaign manager all resigned over the weekend from his campaign leaving only 2-3 staff left.
- The Republican Council of State candidates still haven't said anything to disavow Mark Robinson.
- With Senator Tillis telling his party to forget Mark Robinson and focus on the races "they can win" there hasn't been a statewide Republican candidate even willing to do the morally and politically obvious thing to denounce Mark Robinson and distance themselves from him.
- In the competitive NC-01 congressional district, Congressman Don Davis' opponent Laurie Buckhout still hasn't disavowed Mark Robinson and she also deleted every picture she had with him on her social media platforms (just like Luke Farley).
- **NBC** is reporting that Trump has "no plan to pull his endorsement of Mark Robinson".
- Their silence is deafening. They are complicit in enabling Mark Robinson and they are in lockstep with his dangerous policies.
- Since the CNN report, new comments from Robinson's past have resurfaced and made headlines, including him praising Adolf Hitler's book "Mein Kampf" and saying Black Americans were 'at their highest' under Jim Crow.

Statement from Senator Rachel Hunt, Democratic Nominee for Lieutenant Governor:

"With Mark Robinson & Hal Weatherman running proudly as a ticket, voters are already seeing my opponent in lockstep with Robinson's anti-abortion agenda. Hal Weatherman

even says himself that Mark Robinson's heart is in the right place. Every one of our Council of State races is crucial for the future of our state. We must send a message that this is not who we are and we are not going back."

Statement from Braxton Winston, Democratic Nominee for Labor Commissioner:

"Mark Robinson is too extreme for North Carolina. He is the highest elected Republican in our state and the culture of extremism he fosters runs through the entire slate of the Republican candidates this year. My opponent can delete his photos with Robinson, but he can't delete the contribution to his campaign or endorsement of his extreme agenda."

Statement from Chair Anderson Clayton:

"Mark Robinson and every Republican running for our Council of State are too extreme for North Carolina. Their silence speaks volumes to voters across our state, who know that not only are they sticking with Robinson, but that they will fully support and help implement his agenda if elected. As we move quickly towards the first votes being cast, folks across our state will remember this moment and they will see that the choice is clear — our candidates are bringing experience to the ballot while Republicans are bringing extremism."
