To follow results for all statewide races, check out the <u>NC State Board of Elections</u> <u>election results dashboard</u>.

Check Out the Early Voting Turnout Statistics

Now that Early Voting is over, you can check out the early "one stop" and absentee-by-mail NC election turnout statistics on the Vote Tracker dashboard developed by Civitas/The John Locke Foundation.

The data comes straight from the North Carolina Board of Elections, where it is refreshed each morning during the early voting period with the previous day's data. Vote Tracker's data filter allows you to examine turnout in individual counties or districts and take a closer look at turnout for parts of the electorate with searches based on age, sex, party registration or several other factors.

One Week Until Election Day: NC Democrats Leave it All on the Field Stop doom scrolling. We are in a good spot and we have two days left of GOTV.

Last week, Vice President Kamala Harris returned to NC for a rally in Raleigh, once again emphasizing the importance of the Tar Heel State in this crucial election.

NCDP has left it all on the field this year with year-round organizing, door knocking, candidate recruitment (168 candidates in 170 legislative races), local and national interviews by Chair Clayton that has brought both visibility and investments to our state.

Also last week, VP Harris made a closing argument on the Ellipse in DC, the site of Donald Trump's infamous January 6th rallying cry to the crowd that ultimately stormed the Capitol.

- In her closing argument to the American people, Vice President Harris delivered an optimistic and hopeful speech that stresses her belief in the American people and calls to finally turn the page on the Trump era.
- She painted a picture for Americans about what a first Harris term would look like versus a second Trump term describing their contrasting visions for America.
- With the backdrop of the White House, where either Vice President Harris or Donald Trump will soon sit behind the Resolute Desk, she laid out the choice in clear terms:
 - She paints the picture of Trump, focused on himself and his <u>"enemies</u> <u>list,"</u> instead of the American people.

- And she pledged to always put country above party and self offering a new generation of leadership that can provide a new way forward for the country, to get things done for the American people.

The general election is on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024.

Voter Tools

- 1. <u>Voter Search</u>: Check your voter registration status, sample ballot, party affiliation, Election Day polling place, election districts, voter history (elections you've participated in), and absentee ballot information.
- 2. <u>County Boards of Elections Search</u>: Find contact information for your county board of elections office.
- 3. <u>Election Day Polling Place Search</u>: Enter a residential address to find your polling place. You may also use the <u>Voter Search</u> to find your polling place.
- 4. <u>Voter Registration Statistics Search</u>: See voter registration data, refreshed weekly on Saturday mornings.
- 5. Provisional Search: Check the status of a provisional ballot you cast.
- 6. Petition Search: Find the current status of any petition in North Carolina.

Voter ID:

Voters must show an acceptable photo ID when they check in at their voting site during early voting or on Election Day. Election workers check to see if the picture on the ID reasonably resembles the voter and if the name on the ID is the same as or very similar to the voter's name in their registration record. The address on the photo ID does not have to match the voter registration records.

Acceptable forms of ID:

Any of the following that is unexpired, or expired for one year or less:

- North Carolina driver's license
- State ID from the NCDMV (also called "non-operator ID")

- Driver's license or non-driver ID from another state, District of Columbia, or U.S. territory (only if voter registered in North Carolina within 90 days of the election)
- U.S. Passport or U.S. Passport card
- North Carolina voter photo ID card issued by a county board of elections (see Get a Free Voter Photo ID)
- College or university student ID approved by the State Board of Elections (see box below)
- State or local government or charter school employee ID approved by the State Board of Elections (see the list of accepted student and employee ID)

Note: A voter 65 or older may use an expired form of acceptable ID if the ID was unexpired on their 65th birthday.

Any of the following are accepted, regardless of whether the ID contains an expiration or issuance date:

- Military or veterans ID card (with photo) issued by the U.S. government
- Tribal enrollment card (with photo) issued by a <u>tribe recognized by the</u>
 State of North Carolina or the federal government
- ID card (with photo) issued by an agency of the U.S. government or the State of North Carolina for a public assistance program (Note: Although this is an acceptable form of ID under North Carolina law, the State Board is not aware of any such ID in circulation that contains a photo. All IDs for voting are required to have a photo.)

If the voter does not show an acceptable ID, the voter may proceed to vote in one of the two following ways:

- 1. complete an ID Exception Form and then vote with a provisional ballot, or
- vote with a provisional ballot and then return to their <u>county board of elections office</u> with their photo ID by the day before county canvass. (For municipal elections in September and October, this deadline is the Monday following Election Day. For all other elections, the deadline is the second Thursday following Election Day.)

Absentee-By-Mail Voters:

Voters who vote by mail must include a photocopy of an acceptable ID when returning their ballot, or they may complete an ID Exception Form. The voter places the photocopy of their ID or ID Exception Form in a pocket on the outside of the ballot container envelope, which is then placed in an outer return envelope to protect the privacy of the voter.

Oak View at Siler City Grand Opening

Last week, Wallick cut the ribbon on Oak View at Siler City, their first affordable apartment community in North Carolina. The three apartment buildings are a \$14 million project that was partially funded by the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit, and the Chatham County Housing Trust Funds.

Governor Cooper Signs Disaster Recovery Act – Part II

Governor Roy Cooper signed the following bill into law:

Senate Bill 743: <u>The Disaster Recovery Act of 2024 - Part II.</u>

Governor Cooper issued the following statement on his signing of SB 743:

"Western North Carolina needs significant investments to recover fully from the worst storm our state has ever seen. Legislators have taken a small step here and should follow it with a more comprehensive package to help families, businesses and communities build back stronger."

Funding included in the Disaster Recovery Act - Part II:

- \$16.7 million for the North Carolina Community College System
- \$65 million for the Department of Public Instruction
- \$20 million for the University of North Carolina
- \$71.4 million to the N.C. Department of Health and Human Services
- \$56 million to the Department of Commerce
- \$139 million to the Department of Environmental Quality
- \$130 million to the Department of Public Safety
- \$106 million to general government, including the Office of State Budget and Management and the Treasurer.

Consumer Alert from NC Attorney General Josh Stein

Keep an Eye Out for Fake State and Federal Assistance Programs

Friday, November 1, 2024

Many western North Carolina communities are still picking up the pieces after Hurricane Helene. People are vulnerable right now, and unfortunately, not everyone acts honorably. There is a lot of information out there on legitimate state and federal programs available to North Carolinians, but please be sure to take steps to protect yourself from scammers. Unfortunately, our office has heard reports of people pretending to be government officials to steal your personal information, instead of actually helping you. Keep the below tips in mind to avoid state and federal assistance program scammers.

- Federal and local disaster workers do not solicit or accept money. Do not believe anyone who asks you for payment in return for a disaster grant.
- Don't rely on caller ID to decide if a call is trustworthy. Scammers will use a fake
 phone number or caller ID spoofing technology to make their calls look
 legitimate. The caller ID might even show the government agency's or company's
 name. Make sure you verify who you're speaking with looking up the legitimate
 number and calling it back is always a good idea.
- Do not send money or divulge personal information to unknown contacts, even if they say they represent the government. If you're unsure if someone is a legitimate government official, hang up and contact the government agency directly using a number listed on their website.
- Look for red flags in messages from unfamiliar numbers or email addresses.
 Errors in spelling or grammar, an email that doesn't match an agency's government URL, vague subject lines, or pressure for immediate payment can be indicators that a message is a scam.

Words of Encouragement from Our Friends at County-to-County

We have **TWO CRUCIAL DAYS LEFT** to reach potential voters, to remind them if they haven't mailed in their ballot, they need to drop it off at their county election board, or to answer questions, like where their voting location is. We'll also tell them about how **OUR AMAZING NC Assembly Candidates** can make their lives better!

Why are the **next two days** so important? Lots of people haven't voted! 56 percent of registered voters have voted, but that leaves several million registered voters who haven't! In a recent Marist poll of likely North Carolina voters, nearly 30 percent of them say they intend to vote on **Election Day.** That's a lot of voters, and we need to talk with as many of our Democratic-leaning voters as possible. Last-minute voter turnout can matter significantly in elections, especially in tight races where every vote counts. We know that for some of our candidates, the margin can come down to just a few hundred votes.

WANT SOME GOOD NEWS? There's plenty! The Gender Gap among early voters across several of the battleground states is impressive and encouraging! In North Carolina, the early vote gender gap is 10.5 percent between women and men. There's also a substantial enthusiasm advantage for Democrats. A recent Gallup poll found the percentage of Democrats and Democratic-leaning independents who described themselves as "more enthusiastic" about this year's electoral contest maintained their enthusiasm levels at 77 percent, compared with 67 percent among Republicans. Finally, Thomas Mills of NC Politics reports this: "Even more encouraging, of the Black voters who have not voted, almost 500,000 have a history of voting in either 2022, 2020, or 2018. Most of those voters will likely cast a ballot. Black voters appear well situated to surpass their 2020 turnout."
