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Message from CCDP Chair Sue Blalock

Greetings Chatham Dems,

Like many of you, I am having difficulty processing the results of the election on Tuesday, especially the presidential and judicial races. The losses are bitter and difficult to swallow.

But we also have a lot of victories to celebrate. We elected or reelected:

NC Governor - Josh Stein

NC Lt. Governor - Rachel Hunt

NC Attorney General - Jeff Jackson

NC Secretary of State - Elaine Marshall

NC Superintendent of Public Instruction - Mo Green

NC State Senator - Natalie Murdock

NC House Representative and Democratic Leader - Robert Reives

NC District Court Judges - Samantha Cabe, Hathaway Pendergrass, Sherri Murrell, and Joal Broun

Chatham County Commissioners - Karen Howard and Amanda Robertson Chatham County Board of Education Members - Ana Carlson and David Hamm Chatham Soil and Water Conservation Supervisor - J. Lynn Mann

Finally, our financial contribution to the NC House Caucus helped **break the** supermajority in the NC General Assembly. Governor-elect Stein will have the power of the VETO!

And, Vice President Harris Carried Chatham. Chatham delivered 28,818 votes for Vice President Harris, representing 55.4% of the total votes cast in Chatham. That surpassed our goal of delivering at least 28,000 votes for every candidate we supported. It also surpassed the performance of President Biden in 2020 (26,787 votes representing 55.1% of the votes cast in Chatham) and Hillary Clinton in 2016 (21,065 votes representing 52.9% of the votes cast in Chatham). We are proud to join the other 21 counties in NC where Harris received the majority of votes cast.

Unofficial Turnout Statistics. A total of 52,224 of the 63,252 registered voters in Chatham County voted in the 2024 Election, **giving us the highest overall turnout in North Carolina at 82.6%.** You can check out at the stats here. I expect Democratic turnout in Chatham to be a few percentage points higher, but the data are not yet available to determine the exact percentage.

And that brings us to the 2024 Chatham Turnout Contest. Remember that the contest goal was to guess the number of people who would vote in the 2024 Election, without going under. We had a total of 67 entries. 22 people were eliminated because they under-estimated us. And the winner is (drum roll, please): Ann Willis who estimated that 52,975 people would vote! Great job, Ann.

I have ended many of these messages with the phrase, Forward together! And, that is how I will end this one as well. I am disappointed with America, but I am certainly not disappointed with Chatham Dems. We did what we set out to do and we left it all on the field. In the next few weeks, we will regroup and hit the ground running in 2025. It is clear that we have much more work to do.

We're calling North Carolina likely Democratic voters who had to cast a provisional ballot or whose absentee ballots were rejected by their County Boards of Election, to give them the information they need to get their votes counted! The folks we're calling have already cast their ballot and are committed to making their voices heard in this election, so these calls are less about persuasion than information and guidance. Nevertheless, the calls can be sensitive, as voters may be hearing for the first time that there was a problem with their absentee ballot. But as long as you remain reassuring and informative, voters are nearly always appreciative that somebody reached out to help them.

No experience necessary, though you will need to use your computer, an online script/calling platform, and your phone to make these calls, so comfort with computers is important. We will train you for the first 30 minutes, stay on to support you along the way, and debrief for 10 minutes at the end.

You'll need a computer with internet and a phone; tablets/iPads aren't recommended for compatibility issues.

NCDP Chair Statement on Election Night Results

North Carolina Democratic Party Chair Anderson Clayton released the following statement:

"Last night, the country did not go the way we wanted. We all wanted to see this country choose a new way forward. Vice President Harris ran a bold, hopeful, joyful campaign and I remain thankful for her service to our country and our values. Our role as Democrats just got that much more important. Our neighbors - the world - are looking to us to hold Donald Trump accountable during his presidency.

Here's what gives me hope: despite the national trends, North Carolina Democrats were able to fend off the red wave here at home and reject the most extreme candidates our state has ever seen.

North Carolinians turned the page on Mark Robinson and elected Josh Stein as our next Governor.
